Lough Derg pilgrimage season delayed, but voice of prayer will not be silenced - Father La Flynn, Prior of Lough Derg, has said that while the island pilgrimage season is delayed, the voice of prayer will not be silenced. Father Flynn was speaking as he departed alone from Pettigo in the Diocese of Clogher to the island place of pilgrimage also known as Saint Patrick's Purgatory.

The beginning of June each year marks the start of the traditional Three Day Pilgrimage Season at Lough Derg. In normal times the June holiday weekend on Station Island would be busy with hundreds of pilgrims crossing over to take off their shoes and begin their 'Station'. This year the Prior, Fr La Flynn, has moved alone to the island to keep a prayerful presence there until pilgrims are able to return.

Commenting on the delay of the pilgrimage season, Father Flynn said, "We have to go back almost 200 years to the 1820s, 1828 to be exact, to find a time when the summer pilgrimage season was last suspended, but today, 1st June 2020, my journey across to the island is a solitary one. While in the coming weeks I may not yet be able to welcome pilgrims due to Covid-19, I can at least in a humble way ensure that the voice of prayer does not fall silent in this place that has so long been faithful to the way of St Patrick, the young man who in his time of trial found hope and new purpose in his lonely place among the mountains. This unique tradition of prayer, handed on by pilgrims who have come here season by season from century to century, will be sustained until I can welcome them here again. www.loughderg.org

Saint Barnabas' Story - Feast Day - 11th June

Barnabas, a Jew of Cyprus, comes as close as anyone outside the Twelve to being a full-fledged Apostle. He was closely associated with Saint Paul—he introduced Paul to Peter and the other Apostles—and served as a kind of mediator between the former persecutor and the still suspicious Jewish Christians.

When a Christian community developed at Antioch, Barnabas was sent as the official representative of the church of Jerusalem to incorporate them into the fold. He and Paul instructed in Antioch for a year, after which they took relief contributions to Jerusalem.

Later Paul and Barnabas, now clearly seen as charismatic leaders, were sent by Antioch officials to preach to the gentiles. Enormous success crowned their efforts. After a miracle at Lystra, the people wanted to offer sacrifice to them as gods—Barnabas being Zeus, and Paul, Hermes—but the two said, "We are of the same nature as you, human beings. We proclaim to you good news that you should turn from these idols to the living God" (see Acts 14:8-18).

Barnabas is spoken of simply as one who dedicated his life to the Lord. He was a man "filled with the Holy Spirit and faith. Thereby, large numbers were added to the Lord." Even when he and Paul were expelled from Antioch in Pisidia—modernday Turkey—they were "filled with joy and the Holy Spirit."
